21st April was a day I shall not forget in a hurry. It was the day our eldest granddaughter, Phoebe ran the London Marathon. It was back in early July 2023 that I received a very excited message telling me that she had been successful in her application to run the race. It all seemed so far ahead and didn't seem real until the last couple of months. Of course, it wasn't unreal to Phoebe as she had to put in the time and effort in preparation.

On that Sunday morning, we had breakfast watching the TV coverage. We hurried home from church and had lunch watching TV hoping to have a glimpse of her. We followed her race using a tracker device on my phone. It showed us how far she had got, how long it had taken between given points, and other details of the race. I have to admit that Sunday morning my heart was racing and my stomach churning as the race progressed.

As she was running my mind went back to 2005 when her little sister, Hannah, was diagnosed with leukemia aged 2 ½ years old. Stan and I had been visiting that weekend, and as Hannah was whisked into hospital, we looked after Phoebe who herself was only 4. That weekend was the start of weeks, months, and years of treatment for Hannah and heartache for the family as Hannah underwent the procedures associated with chemotherapy and many setbacks. Through it all the cancer charity, ClicSargent (now Young Lives Vs Cancer) helped in many practical ways, not only Hannah but by providing activities in which the whole family could participate. That is the reason why I was not surprised that Phoebe chose to run the Marathon raising support for it. She said she wanted "to give something back" and she has, because her sponsors between them raised over £3,000!

We may not be called to God's work in the same way Paul was, but we all have a course to run, a finishing line to cross, an expectation to fulfil. Our reward, our prize will not be something to see until we receive it from Jesus, but we can feel the same sense of achievement that I think you can see on Phoebe's face, when the medal was hung around her neck.
